Cultivating Reverence

- **Deut 5:24-27** - We must take God more seriously
- **Jer 30:21** – It is a daring thing to attempt to approach the living God! Our life depends on it!
- **Deut 8:3** - We must realize the nutrition of God’s word. What would our souls look like if they were visible?

“Many of us would say we love God. If we actually do, that’s a good thing. But the truth about whether we love Him or not is revealed by the depth of our *determination to be close to Him*. So, how easily are we distracted from thinking about Him? How much time do we spend actually working on our relationship with Him? What price would we pay to keep from losing Him?” – Gary Henry, *Reaching Forward*, January 10

Setting Goals

- **Daniel 1:8, 2 Chron 2:1, Luke 9:51** – Determination to move forward is the impetus we need
- We need specific, tangible checkpoints to broad, spiritual goals
- **Heb 12:1-2** – We need *endurance*. We need *reminders*. Use objects around the house to remind you—Ceiling verses, bathroom mirror, etc.
- **Eph 5:15-16** - Time management is key!

Consider the Example of Jesus:

- **Mark 1:35** – Got up, had a time and place to pray, away from distractions. Made sacrifices.
- **Matt 9:36** – We must cultivate *compassion* for the lost! That’s what our Lord did.

“Prayer takes time, and those who have spent a great deal of time praying have had to make some sacrifices. Whatever it is that we’ve been doing while they were praying, they’ve had to do without those things.” – Gary Henry, *Diligently Seeking God*, Nov 30

“Without setting deliberate goals, we simply "drift" -- occasionally stumbling forward perhaps, but more often than not falling backward into further neglect and worldliness. ... Most importantly, however, we need to *study the character of Jesus Christ* and let Him define our concept of spiritual maturity. What we're aiming to do is “grow up in all things into Him who is the head” (**Eph 4:15**).
